NKARC INTO CB

NKARC will sponsor an amateur radio exhibit at the "CB FAIR" on May 15-16. The event will be held at the Cincinnati Convention Center and will attract 25,000 CB'ers from the area! The amateur radio display will stress the differences and advantages of ham radio as a communications hobby.

The "CB FAIR" will resemble the exhibitor portion (inside) of the Dayton Hamvention - with manufacturers exhibiting all types of equipment and antennas. The event is open to the public on Saturday (May 15) from noon till 10 pm, and Sunday from noon till 6 pm. We still need volunteers to help man the exhibit booth. CODE & THEORY

NKARC sponsored code and theory classes will start Wednesday, May 5 at 7:30 pm. The initial course will be geared toward obtaining the Novice class license. The classes will meet at Highlands High School in Ft. Thomas and will last 10 to 12 weeks.

The class fee will be \$10, and will include four ARRL publications, refreshments, and '76 NKARC membership dues. To enroll (or obtain more information), contact Roger Troy at 661-5306.

Technician and General classes will possibly be held next fall (possible location is Northern Kentucky State).

VHF CONTEST

Mark June 12-13 on your calendar! It's the date of the ARRL VHF contest. Six and two meter operations are planned by the club - but we still need a 2 mtr ssb amplifier or complete transmitter. (And does anyone have 220 or 432 mhz gear??)

Joe Fhirman, W8SHYP, has loaned his complete station to the club - 6 and 2 mtr beams and a Drake TR-6 (300 w) with a 2 mtr converter and a transverter (1 w). The club already has a Telrex 11 element spiral array for 6 mtr mounted at 50'.

The last VHF contest that NKARC participated in was the January contest - with good results (even though there were no 'E' openings). Scores should appear in the next issue of QST - we'll see how we placed with the other stations.

Club president Roger Troy, WB8WHS, called the meeting to order at 8:10 p.m. The minutes of the March meeting were approved as read.

- The location of the code and theory classes was discussed, with the committee meeting right after the meeting to make a decision. Dave Heil, WB4KTR, was appointed temporary committee chairman.

- WA8OGS asked the club if it was interested in setting up an amateur radio display at the "CB FAIR" on May 15-16. A sheet was passed around for those interested to sign.

- WB8HYP made his complete station available for club use till the completion of his relocation.

- WA4KUB has sent letters to manufacturers thanking them for door prizes, price quotes, etc. concerning the Ham-O-Rama. An update on the forums was also given.

- It was decided to sell the 50' push-up mast at the club trailer. \$40 will be asked.

- WB4VOA reported on the talk given by the staff from ARRL HQ in Cincinnati last month.

- K4JBV passed out major prize tickets for the Ham-O-Rama drawing. 30 were given to each member. WA4KUB gave a full report on all donations for the event.

- K4MEE has ordered membership cards. He also reported that all the club coax (8214 @ 18 1/2¢ a foot) has been sold to club members. More may be ordered at a later date if there is interest. Those still owing the club for coax received are reminded to pay the club treasurer.

- K4MEE is still investigating combination locks, to be used at the club trailer to make it more accessible to all club members.

The meeting adjourned at about 9:20 p.m. WA8OGS presented a slide program on antenna towers, etc. following the meeting.

to lose amateur frequencies to this other service (they would certainly put 220 mhz to much more use than we do!). And once we lose one frequency band, the next could go even easier. Unless something is done soon, the amateur will be the ignored minority.

The alternative is a big PR push - to show others what amateur radio offers. That's the reason for the NKARC sponsored exhibit.

International newspapers reported on 16 January 1976 the death of Dr. Hidetsugu Yagi at the age of 89 in Toyko, Japan.

Dr. Yagi, Japanese radio pioneer, was the inventor of the well-known Yagi array antenna. His first paper was in 1928. Yagi was educated at the university of Tokyo, London, Harvard, and the Hochschul in Dresden, Germany. In 1959 he received the Poulson Gold Medal from Denmark.

Most all radio amateurs for the past 30 years have used the Yagi antenna in HF and VHF work, but many did not know that a world-reknown Japanese scientist developed this essential principle. (Reprinted from Worldradio News, March '7
